On SATURDAY 10th NOVEMBER

As part of Presteigne Remembers Homecoming, local singers and musicians will gather for a **CONCERT FOR PEACE**, arranged by Marion Rowlatt, starting 7.30pm at St. Andrew's Church, Presteigne. The Concert is free with donations to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

On REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 11th NOVEMBER

10.15am - **Laying of Wreaths at the War Memorial** by representatives of past and serving members of all services and other organisations, 2 minutes silence and the Last Post, then process along Hereford Street and Broad Street to St. Andrew's Church, to the sound of the muffled church bells.

10.50am - Service of Remembrance at St. Andrew's Church, led by the Rev. Stephen Hollinghurst which will include the reading of the names of those from the parish who 'gave their lives' in the Great War of 1914-18.
10am to 4pm - at The Judge's Lodging, the final day of "TO THE FAMILIES, ONE COIN" a Great War miniexhibition (free entry). For those families who lost loved ones in the conflict, a memorial plaque was issued. Known popularly as "The Dead Man's Penny", over 1 million were cast. This exhibition displays a collection of these commemorative medallions, and tells the story of their production and the men who received them. Also on display will be information on every soldier from Presteigne who lost their life in this conflict.

THE DRAGON DEPARTS....

When the Sleeping Dragon leaves its position at Corton Roundabout, Presteigne, it will have been there for all of the 1,546 days that was the living hell of the First World War. Very few survived the entirety of the war, many died along the way, many have no grave.

The Sleeping Dragon, by Presteigne artist, blacksmith and sculptor Pete Smith, is an interactive representation of that disturbing fact, and during the four years of the Dragon's residence on the Welsh border, the number of Royal British Legion crosses left at the cromlech each Armistice grows. Each cross carries the name of a soldier who died, inscribed by whoever is placing the cross in an individual act of remembrance.

This year, 2018, is the centenary of the Armistice itself and it is hoped that as many people as possible, from wherever they live, Welsh or not, will buy and name a small wooden cross to be placed at the Dragon in time for the armistice so the final piece of the the Dragon's purpose can be revealed. That final purpose is that, when the Dragon leaves for his homecoming party, he will leave hundreds of little red poppy crosses randomly placed behind him, each one representing a soldier who will not be going to the party, but instead will lie in lonely silence, in a distant place.

Please join us at the Corton Roundabout for the Sleeping Dragon's homecoming to become part of the Armistice itself - bring your torches and your voices as our Dragon gets ready to leave its cromlech with ceremony, and process on its carriage to the Memorial Hall.

At **4pm** by the Dragon, the guns will fall silent, the Last Post will sound, and there will be a reading of a short poem commissioned for the day, before the Dragon leads a torchlight procession along the bypass. As the procession gets underway, the now unmuffled bells of St. Andrew's will ring out across the valley until the Dragon arrives at the Memorial Hall for his Homecoming Party.

The aim is to carpet the area around the Dragon with a thousand small wooden crosses that will over time crumble into the ground - so bring a cross with you please - they'll be available all over town in the days leading up to the weekend

5pm HOMECOMING PARTY at the Memorial Hall - bar, songs and dancing to celebrate the end of the war and the coming of peace. A café and bar will be open to lubricate both the vocal chords and the soul to aid singing with passion. The evening will end with a Silence followed by the national anthem of Wales "Hen Walden Fy Nhadau" (Old Land of my Fathers). Come dressed up for 1918 - come to party!!!!
